AICE Marking Rubric Paper 3

Underlined words are the difference between level 4 and 5.

Level 5, 21-25

- The presentation <u>clearly</u> defines an issue which arises from detailed and <u>varied</u> research.
- The candidate's perspective is <u>sharply</u> differentiated from alternative team or research perspectives.
- The presentation is **logically** structured and **<u>coherently</u>** argued with <u>clear</u> lines of reasoning and **well-supported** judgements.
- The candidate's conclusion is **based** <u>logically</u> on the evidence and reasoning presented and proposes an **effective and** <u>innovative</u> solution to the issue.
- <u>Appropriate</u> presentational methods are used <u>creatively</u> and <u>fully</u> effectively to communicate the candidate's arguments and ideas to the audience.

Presentation – 5pts

<u>Clearly</u> defines an issue – You have an issue. Make sure your presentation defines it, addresses it, and explains the problem clearly. The issue shouldn't be vague. Select a specific topic, broad topics are not good for presenting.

Detailed and <u>Varied</u>- Vagueness is an issue here as well. A vague question usually ends in a cliché problem and presentation. Make it different, unique, and interesting. (Even if you do have a cliché or overdone topic, the quality of your presentation and research should make it amazing) Global examples are detailed and varied. Research the problem in Sarasota or Florida.

Perspective - 5pts

<u>Sharply</u> differentiated- Not only a new perspective on the issue, but defined and explained how you got that perspective from your group, clearly defining each. State why yours and others are important, and how you selected them.

Content-5pts

Logically structured*- Flow, Reasons, and Examples. Have an order, a process that can be followed by the viewer. WE GIVE YOU THE STRUCTURE!

<u>Coherently</u> argued- Analysis, and Judgement, don't ramble, stay on the specific problem.

<u>Clear</u>- Does your examples match your reason? Are your reasons relevant? Analysis is clearly showing to <u>prove</u>. **REPEAT** Based on the evidence and reasons, use examples of the reasons and analyze source and content.

<u>**Based**</u> – on evidence and reasons. Use example of the reasons and **analyze** sources and content.

Solution – 5pts

Logically based conclusion- Do you recap? Recap your reasons and give your final message.

Effective and <u>innovative</u> solution- What can YOU do specifically? Do research on similar communities, similar issues, dig deeply. It matters. How is this useful to the problem? What can you add to the conversation to solve the problem? Cliché solutions aren't innovative, think small, think locally and globally.

Presentation Skills – 5pts

<u>Appropria</u>te presentation- Do you have a presence? Will the grader remember your name? This is not only determined by content but also stage presence. Basic presentation skills will make you pass, great presentation skills will make you succeed. Stand out from the crowd! Know your material. Practice, Practice, Practice!

<u>Creatively</u> and <u>fully</u> effectively- What makes your presentation stand out? Is it your pictures? Is it your cool theme? Is it your sources? What makes your presentation different from everyone else's. Say it if you need to. Interact with your PowerPoint. Talk from the **heart** not a script. Be passionate about something that interests you!
