Operative Vocabulary for Utilization in Writing

1. Biased

- a. Jaundiced (Adjective) having opinions affected by bitterness, resentment, or envy
- b. Predisposed (Adjective) liable or inclined to a specific attitude, or action
- c. Bigoted (Adjective) having or revealing an obstinate belief in the superiority of one's own opinions and a prejudiced intolerance of the opinions of others
- d. Skewed (Adjective) biased or distorted in a way that is regarded as inaccurate, unfair, or misleading
- e. Slanted (Adjective) presentation or viewing [of information] from a particular angle, especially in a biased or unfair way.
- f. Partial (Adjective) favoring one side of a dispute over another; showing or having favoritism

2. Educated

- a. Erudite (Adjective) having or showing great knowledge or learning
- b. Cerebral (Adjective) of, or relating to, intellect rather than emotion or feeling
- c. Edified (Adjective) instructed or improved morally or spiritually
- d. Savant (Noun) a scholarly person, especially a distinguished scientist
- e. Pundit (Noun) an expert in a particular subject or field who is frequently called on to give opinions about it in public
- f. Maven (Noun) an expert or connoisseur

3. Reliable

- a. Steadfast (Adjective) resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering
- b. Staunch (Adjective) of strong and firm construction
- c. Indubitable (Adjective) impossible to doubt, unquestionable
- d. Incontestable (Adjective) not to be disputed
- e. Unequivocal (Adjective) absolute, unambiguous, clear, understood

4. Valid

- a. Viable (Adjective) capable of working successfully; proven true; feasible
- b. Bona fide (Adjective) genuine, real, without intention to deceive
- c. Credible (Adjective) able to be believed; convincing
- d. Sound (Adjective) based on reason, sense, or judgement; logical
- e. Cogent (Adjective) clear, logical, researched, convincing

5. However

- a. Nevertheless (Adverb) in spite of that, notwithstanding, all the same
- b. Contrariwise (Adverb) in the opposite way or order
- c. Conversely (Adverb) introducing a statement or idea that reverses one that had just been made or referred to
- d. Yet (Adjective) nevertheless, all the same

6. Experienced

- a. Adept (Adjective) very skilled or proficient in something
- b. Adroit (Adjective) clever or skillful in the use of hands or mind
- c. Sagacious (Adjective) having or showing keen mental discernment and good judgement; shrewd
- d. Perspicacious (Adjective) having a ready insight into the understanding of things
- e. Virtuoso (Noun) a person highly skilled or knowledgeable in a particular field
