

How to Properly Do Citations

Summary:

Citations

- Always use the authors last name in a parenthetical and in body citation.
- (Last name, date)
- (title, date)
- (title of webpage, date)
- If two authors (Senior Name & Name, date)
- If three authors (Senior Name, Next important, Last important)
- If more than four authors (Name et al, 2019)
- Any date or statistics must be cited

References

- Starts a new page
- All double spaced
- Hanging indent
- Alphabetize
- Around 20 references.

With one author:

- Have the last name of the author followed by the publishing date of the article or quote
- There are two ways (in-body):

For References:

1. Starts a new page
2. only have the word references with *no special characteristics* attached to it to include all of your citations
3. All double spaced
4. Hanging indent
5. Alphabetize
6. Around 10-20 references depending on the size of the paper

*also notice how I highlighted the in-body citation and the beginning of the reference; these **need both start with the same name**

**if having trouble doing citations, use: citation machine

With two authors:

- in the first method, write out the word “and” to separate author last names
- in the second method, you must use “&” to separate author last names; the same is true for references

Knechtle and Nikolaidis, (2018) stated:

In an ultra-marathon of 1,005 km... 32 runners experienced a total of 64 different problems, of... [the] Achilles tendonitis, femoropatellar pain, and inflammation of extensor tendons in the foot [which] were the most common problems...

OR

With three authors:

With four or more authors:

- To guarantee that the citation is right, **only** use the in-body citation at the end of the quote

Athletes in this study showed low tension, depression, anger, fatigue and confusion scores, and high vigour scores. The measure of global mood and trait anxiety accounted for 45 % of the variance in athlete performance, highlighting the link between positive mental health and performance... (Rice et al, 2016).

If no authors than use title

- For this citation, the title needs to be italicized

In this journal there's no primary research by Schiller and the author only sees one side of the argument; nevertheless, the journal is peer reviewed from the International Journal of Neuropsychopharmacology, the data is a comparison of studies done by astute authors, and Schiller has a PhD in psychobiology and a BA in psychology and philosophy (*Daniela Schiller, 2020*).
