It is no coincidence that every second 3,000 animals are killed for the use of food by humans every year and instances of humans killing each other occur every 60 seconds. According to Dr. Hillman,

"Farm animals are stunned by electricity or percussion, and killed by cutting the blood vessels in the neck, causing exsanguination. The halal and shechita method, used by Moslems and Jews, involves cutting the neck without stunning the animals. Shooting may be at close quarters. Fish caught at sea or by anglers die of asphyxia, when they are taken out of the water; anglers sometimes throw fish back after withdrawing the hooks; the fish may then die of inability to eat, or microbial or fungal infections. Trapping, snaring and hunting are rarely used in Britain for animals which are to be eaten." (Hillman, "The Slaughter of Animals for Food", 2015)

Once again, the idea of torturing innocent animals is reinforced in the extract from this article. In my opinion, regardless of the different methods used to slaughter animals, none of them are humane or fair in any way. It is understood that humans need food to eat, but there needs to be a better way of killing the animals. Harold Hillman is a British scientist and expert in the neurobiology of execution methods. He also received a Nobel Peace Prize for his report on "The Possible Pain Experienced During Execution by Different Methods". However, Hillman's expertise is in various types of sciences including, neurobiology, cytology, and cell biology and neither pertain directly to animal mistreatment.

Not only are humans unkind to animals, but we are extremely cruel to each other. It could be said that we are the only species that is violent to one another and enjoys doing it. In the instance of war, the majority of the time it takes place over greed or a disagreement in opinion or belief.

According to BBC,

"In the 1970s and 1980s Uganda was notorious for its human rights abuses, first during the military dictatorship of Idi Amin from 1971-79 and then after

the return to power of Milton Obote, who had been ousted by Amin. During this time up to half a million people were killed in state-sponsored violence." ("Uganda country profile - BBC News", May 21st, 2015)

Rodriguez, at great risk to his own life, re-entered the Towers three times after the first, North Tower impact at about 8:46 A.M., and is believed to be the last person to exit the North Tower alive, surviving the building's collapse by diving beneath a fire truck."
